Higher Farm is an agroecological farm whose vision is to be local, accessible and natural. Biodiversity Audit

Tom, our entomologist, is in preparation to uncover the six-legged secrets that The Newt in Somerset has been hiding. He aims to conduct an invertebrate audit across three locations on the estate: The Kitchen Garden, The Parabola, and the wildflower meadow. His goal is to discover the insect species present in these areas and subsequently use this information to inform conservation and management projects at The Newt, ensuring continued biodiversity.

During this process, he hopes to engage with the local community and wildlife groups, involving them wherever possible to educate about the importance of invertebrates and how they can aid in addressing the biodiversity crisis.

In other exciting news Tom has discovered some rather obscure stemmining flies that until recently were thought to be extinct. Inspired by research by the Agromyzidae Recording Scheme, Tom focused his search at Avalon Farm and as result is the first person to record the presence of the Hawthorn Stem Mining Fly (Phytobia carbonaria) and the second to record the Blackthorn Stem Mining Fly (phytobia cerasiferae) in Somerset.

Farm

The weather has felt against us in recent weeks. The particularly wet weather conditions have been especially bad on our local farmers at an already demanding time. Our farm manager Cameron found a moment to give us an update:

"It has been a busy February on the farm as lambing is in full swing with our pedigree Dorset Down ewes and our commercial flock. Our pedigree British White cattle have also started their spring calving, with a beautiful set of twins marking the start of the next 8 weeks of calving. We have also seen the addition of our charismatic water buffalo to our farming operations. These unique and friendly buffalo are milked every day to provide our new Creamery with rich buffalo milk to produce our new buffalo cheeses, yogurts, and gelato."

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

A359 Bridge

The new bridge over the A359 by Avalon Farm has been successfully installed, with the second phase concrete pour planned for either the 5th or 15th April. The bridge, of similar design to the popular Viper bridge at the Story of Gardening, will help reduce farm traffic on our local roads and will also provide a safe route to connect the Macmillan Way as it will be made a permissive bridleway. We know the danger for walkers trying to traverse that busy road and hope that the bridge will increase the accessibility of such a significant route.



Community Flooding Response

We've been grateful for the continued support of our neighbours for sharing information and collaborating over flood prevention measures. Zoe our Community Liaison, will be in attendance at local resilience planning meetings going forward. She will also be meeting with the Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group to understand whether our planned mitigations meet their recommendations.

The Creamery

The final finishes are being put on the Creamery renovation with a handover to our operational team expected mid-April, closely followed by our first milk delivery. It has been a successful recruitment drive with a number of local applicants and some well-deserved internal promotions too. Details of opening dates are coming soon!
